- **Capital Punishment** - Punishment by death. (Not allowed in the UK)
- **Corporal Punishment** - Punishment by physical pain. (Not allowed in the UK)
- **Custodial Sentence** - Length of time in prison.
- **Probation** - Granting a person in prison freedom on the promise of good behaviour.
- **Retribution** - To punish a person for what crime they committed.
- **Deterrence** - The threat of punishment to stop people from committing illegal acts.
- **Reformation** - To change the way a person acts.
- **Vindication** - To show that the law has been upheld.
